

The 20th and "Final" reunion of the 3rd Emergency Rescue Squadron was held in Dothan, Alabama, September 19 to 23, 2007. Hosts for this meeting were **Frances and Selden Bailey**, assisted by **Jay Ashmore** and **Bill MacDermott**. Site for the get together was the same Comfort Inn at which we met in 1997.

Attendance - A marked increase in attendance over last year suggests that designation as a "final" meeting motivated many to assemble "one more time". There were 43 members of our "family" present **Jay and Margaret Ashmore**, **Bud Baden** and grandson **Joel Baden**, **Elsa Bacher**, **Selden and Frances Bailey**, **Brownie and Peggy Brownback**, **Tony and Mary Ellen Colafrancesco** and son **Rich and wife Gina Colafrancesco**, **Ed and Cathy Dahl**, **Jeanette Haak** and daughter **Cheryl Ziola**, **Rod and Marge Harris**, **Bill and Pat Leist**, **Ed Linn** and friend **Suzan Bright**, **Horace and Virginia Luton**, **Bill MacDermott** **Royal Miller** and son **Chuck Miller**, **Al Perry** and son **Keith Perry**, **Sqwecky and Freda Struchen**, **Liz (Kelly) Stumpf** and sister **Rose Kramer**, **Carl and Ann Wood** and daughter **Cindy Guidry** and grandson **Theo Guidry**, plus five special guests - **Juliette Hanks**, **Jim and Nina Hanks**, and **John and Beverly Hanks**. There were 15 returning veterans, the rest being wives, widows, children, grandchildren, and special guests.

Wednesday, Sept 19

The tradition of early arrivals continued when **Ed and Cathy Dahl** arrived with a new member of their family, Tequila Not much later, **Sqwecky and Freda Struchen** pulled up in their passenger car equipped with a back-bumper mount for Sqwecky's motorized mobility chair. By early evening, a large group met for dinner at the local Cracker Barrel - **Bailey's, Ashmores, Leists, Lutons, Struchens**, and **Bill MacDermott**. After dinner conversations continued in the breakfast area of the motel.

Thursday, Sept. 20

An extended Continental Breakfast was enjoyed by all as we prepared to meet the new arrivals throughout the day. Early in the morning, we met **Ed Linn** and his friend, **Suzan Bright**. Ed was in the 3rd ERS in Japan, 1945-1946, and has been on **Joe Horvath's** mailing list for years, but this was his first attendance at a reunion. He brought with him many new pictures of the 3rd ERS we had not seen and also an aged photo album of his father's from WW1. Considering its age, the picture quality was very good and the album attracted the attention of many of the men

Before noon, a reporting crew from the Dothan Eagle arrived and interviewed **Jay Ashmore** and **Bill MacDermott** for about 20 minutes, drawing from them impressions and recollections of the 3rd ERS in WWII. Early in the afternoon, the hospitality room was opened for our use. Late in the afternoon the five members of the **Hanks**, family arrived and this marked the first time at all our reunions that we were joined by people the Squadron had lifted out of harm's way during WWII. With the arrival of the **Brownbacks**, all were present except for **Bud and Joel Baden**, (flying in on Joel's airplane)

Friday, Sept. 21

After early breakfast, we loaded into the Methodist Church bus and headed for Fort Rucker, a half-hour's drive to the west. Arrival at the US Army Aviation Museum was about a half-hour ahead of schedule, which gave ample opportunity for touring the displays in the building. Fort

Rucker had "rolled out the red carpet" for our Squadron. The 3rd Emergency Rescue Squadron Memorial Stone was displayed prominently on the stage, sandwiched between two panels of black-and-white 13x10 photographs of the Squadron in action during WWII. The stone was a thing of beauty, about 2 foot by 3 foot, polished black granite with lettering in gold (picture attached). The photos included several of the **Hanks'** family pickup from Culion Island in February of 1945. It was unfortunate that the two surviving members of our Catalina crew that day, Pilot **Dick Taggart** and Engineer, **Charley Cramer**, were not able to be present

The Memorial Service itself started at 11:30, invocation by Army Chaplain, **Major Chad Maxey**, followed by the main memorial tribute given by the Base Chaplain, **Col. Barry Bowden**. During Col Bowden's tribute, many of our veterans reflected inwardly: "did we really do all that?" Over three hundred saved, including three members of the Hanks family seated with us. The proceedings were sandwiched in between Three beautiful musical renditions by **Mrs Becky Guthrie**: our "National Anthem", "America the Beautiful and " God Bless America". There followed a several minutes of absolute solemnity as **Selden Bailey** recited the names of those 23 of our comrades who perished in the service of the Squadron overseas in 1944-46, from New Guinea to Japan. The haunting strains of " Taps" were followed by a final benediction by Major Maxey and the tribute to the wartime service of the 3rd ERS was concluded. There followed 15 to 20 minutes of picture taking and meeting the Fort Rucker Garrison Commander, **Col. Scott Larese**, who appeared to be so very young for such responsibility.

The bus was reboarded for a short ride to the Warrant Officers Mess, where we joined active duty personnel for the lunch hour, preceded by a moving songfest by the graduating class of the day - a series of staccato military chants delivered with absolute precision and great volume. The lunch itself was cafeteria style, the quality being remarkably better than any of our veterans could remember for stateside mess halls of 1944. We were honored by the arrival of the Fort Rucker Base Commander, **Major General "Duz" Hackett**, a close friend of Seldens. Sharing lunch with a two-star general was an experience which still impressed our veterans, though we had doffed our own uniforms 62 years ago..

After the luncheon bill was paid, the bus was reloaded and returned to the Comfort Inn. After so much activity, many were sufficiently tired that a midday nap felt very good. We were soon joined by **Bud and Joel Baden**, whose plane had been forced down by bad weather. By late afternoon and early evening, the Hospitality Room was at full capacity and many ate there for the evening meal, sandwiches brought in from Winn-Dixie. Prominently on display was a promotional model for Corona Beer, an inflatable plastic airplane model bearing a great resemblance to a PB4Y, brought all the way from New Hampshire by **Royal Miller**.

Saturday, Sept. 22

At breakfast, **Selden Bailey** distributed copies of the Dothan Eagle, with a front-page article on the 3rd ERS reunion, based on Thursday's interview of **Jay Ashmore** and **Bill MacDermott**. In addition, **Chuck Miller** was busy setting up his laptop computer in the Hospitality Room to show the video associated with the interview. The Eagle video crew had done a great job including many short clips of Catalinas landing and taking off and also a clip of a B-17H dropping one of the Higgins rescue lifeboats, a clip none had seen before. Although no organized sight-seeing was scheduled, several small groups struck out on their own to various

destinations. **Bud and Joel Bden** drove out to rescue their downed airplane.

Atmosphere in the Hospitality Room was rather nostalgic in the afternoon as attendees jointly realized that these pleasant meetings were coming to an end. At this 20th reunion, reminiscing was as much on the past reunions as on the events of 60 years ago. The room was emptied at 5 00 to permit the banquet caterer to set up tables with cloths and tableware. The Hospitality Room was just large enough to accommodate 45 people (43 3rd ERS's and the evening's speaker and wife); a serving line was set up in the breakfast area of the motel. Back in the rooms, ladies concentrated on dressing while men mixed dressing with checking on football games of the day, just winding up. Serving began at 6:30 and the line was long enough that those first in line were finishing their meals just as the tail-enders were sitting down to eat.

After a short break, **Bill MacDermott** gave the floor to **Jim Hanks** to deliver his remarks of gratitude to the 3rd ERS for its role in extracting them from the Japanese threat in February 1947. He shared many interesting details of their family life working at the Cullon lepers sanitarium during the occupation. The main speaker of the evening was **Jack Scott**, an employee of a Dothan firm doing business in the Mideast. He managed to present several areas of religious motivation by drawing parallels between these and the mission and achievements of the 3rd ERS during W WII.

After a brief humorous interlude by **Jay Ashmore**, **Selden Bailey** then presented certificates of his', appreciation to all of the veterans; who had served overseas with the Squadron, accompanied by a handshake and snappy salute. A quick vote was taken to present the 3rd ERS Squadron Banner to Selden, the Banner which had graced the hospitality room at most of our reunions. He had already accepted from **Royal Miller** the flying boat model which had been autographed by most of the men present. At this point it was deemed that the final reunion of the 3rd ERS had been accomplished and that future contacts would be maintained by the twice-yearly Newsletter, promised by **Bill MacDermott**, and perhaps, smaller-scale, regional meetings as personal circumstances allowed. **Peggy Brownback** got up in the midst of more than a few misty eyes and Said that she "didn't want it to end" She proposed holding one more meeting next year at Omaha, Nebraska, which she and Brownie would Host. A vote was taken to see how many people would try their best to be at such a meeting and, as far as could be seen, nearly every hand went up The Brownbacks were thanked for their support of the Squadron and wished well on whatever they might be able to do for another meeting next year. Thus ended the "final reunion of the 3rd ERS.

Sunday Sept. 23

A departure breakfast was shared by all in the motel lobby. Bags of peanuts from **Frances Bailey's** brother were handed out. Those facing long road trips were up early and on the road before some of the others came to breakfast. The mood was distinctly upbeat, considering the possibility of meeting again in 2008, whether it will be considered an official reunion or simply a "family get-together"

XXXX - Hanks Family

In February, 1944, the 3rd ERS was assigned a mission to evacuate a family of Americans from the tiny island of Culion, in the Philippines near Mindoro. **Dr. John Hanks**, his wife and three children were living on Culion, where he was conducting research on leprosy at the sanitarium there. As American forces advanced in the Philippines, it was feared the Japanese would exact retribution against all foreigners, especially Americans still working in the Islands. General MacArthur directed the evacuation mission be accomplished. A detailed description of this mission is given in the 3rd ERS Unit History (pp.68-70). The evacuation was successfully carried out and freed Dr Hanks, his wife Julia, sons John age 13, Jim age 12, and infant daughter, Julliette, age 15 months. Mother and father passed away some years ago and it is John and wife Beverly, Jim and wife Nina, and little Juliette we have welcomed to our final reunion.

XXXX -3rd ERS Website

Chuck Miller was so energized by the 3 days at Dothan that he promptly set up a website for the Squadron when he got home - www.3rders.com. Since it is so new, it is riot yet very big -- the Dothan Eagle newspaper article on our reunion, the associated video, a 2-112 page summary history of the Squadron, and a series of photos taken at Dothan- There are several more items under consideration for posting after the first of the year. Also, Chuck purchased 100 E-Mail accounts with the domain name and these are available to anyone who would like a second E-mail address associated with the Sqdn. Jeanette herself recently went through a 4-hour "outpatient" surgery by a plastic surgeon for removal of excess tissue in her arms. She expects the stitches to be taken out the week before Xmas.

During the spring and summer, Joe suffered a series of problems - gout, cellulitis, and arthritis in one knee, which problems combined to keep him from the reunion. She continues to do the driving for the two of them - only about 2000 miles a year for grocery stores, Dr offices, etc-, but they "shut down" after dark. Glenn, who will be 84 in February, was reminded in a recent phone conversation with **Charley Cramer** that it was Charley who presented Glenn with the Silver Star decoration he had received for being a volunteer on the Lingayen Gulf Mission in 1945 (Unit History, pp 64-66). The presentation occurred in Manila on their way home. Sandy told Charley he had forgotten about it, - possibly because Charley had not rendered the traditional kiss on the cheek for such an occasion
